PRESENTATION AND SPEAKER DESCRIPTIONS

Introduction to Apologetics, Michael Berg (1-, 2-, or 3-hour talks available)

Christians have been given the command to "Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have" (1 Peter 3:15). But what does that look like? In this presentation we will explore the ways Christians have and can speak about their faith to the skeptic. How might a philosopher, a scientist, a lawyer, an historian, or even an artist look at the evidence of God's existence and specifically the facts of Christ's resurrection? Each has a unique vantage point about the same basic fact: Christ rose from the dead and defeated the devil for you and me.

We Believe and Know: An Introduction to Evidential Apologetics, Caleb Bassett (1-hour talks to a full course available)

American society has become pluralistic and secular. The Christian tradition is no longer a common heritage. As a result, approaches to evangelism that worked well in the past have seemingly little purchase on the hearts and minds of people swimming in today's cultural currents. Rather than lament the state of affairs, Christians can instead explore the practice of evidential apologetics as a timely and effective toolkit for evangelism in contemporary settings. This presentation will summarize the evidential approach to apologetics, demonstrate its particular strength as a Lutheran approach to evangelism, and offer participants a guide for further study in the field.

Presenter: Rev. Caleb R. Bassett serves as pastor of Our Redeemer Lutheran Church in Madison, Wisconsin. Before that he served for over a decade in Southern California. He is a Fellow of the International Academy

of Apologetics, Evangelism, and Human Rights in Strasbourg, France and a member of the Steering Committee of the WELS Institute for Lutheran Apologetics.

The church in the West finds itself in a strange world where postmodernists say there's no such thing as truth, where critical theorists say it's all about power, and where many scientists envision the world as free from the supernatural. How do we share the truth of Christ in this kind of culture? Join us as we see just how deep secularism has affected the church, but also how God has put us in a time perfect for gospel ministry.

Presenter Bio: Luke Thompson (M.Div theology, M.A. philosophy) taught philosophy courses at Wisconsin Lutheran College and Bethany Lutheran College before becoming a pastor in WELS. He served eight years in Ottawa, ON, Canada, at St. Paul Evangelical Lutheran, and for over twenty years he has worked with and help start campus ministries, presenting internationally on apologetics, philosophy, and pop culture. His most recent divine call is to Martin Luther College, where he teaches theology, history, and philosophy and leads a "film and philosophy" club and a Great Books club. He is author of *Your Life Has Meaning* (a study on Ecclesiastes and philosophy) (NPH) and co-author of *Quick to Listen* (NPH).

The Scientific Revolution and its Aftermath (3-, 4-, or 5-hour talks available)

During the 17th and 18th century, there was a significant shift in how people thought about the world and our place in it. This shift is sometimes called the *scientific revolution*. It is associated with names such as Galileo Galilei, Rene Descartes, Isaac Newton, Robert Boyle and Francis Bacon. But what, exactly, were these so-called ``scientific revolutionaries'' rebelling against? After all, a great deal of scientific knowledge about the world had already been acquired and applied by the 17th century.

Upon careful inspection, it seems that the revolution of the 17th century was less a scientific revolution than a *philosophical*—and even a *theological*—revolution. During this tumultuous time, ancient and traditional views about the world, about man, and about God were largely abandoned in favor of a purely *mechanistic* and *materialistic* world-view.

This radical change, ushered in by many well-meaning Christians, in the name of science, had profound unintended consequences. For example, if *modern science* now maintains that man is merely a complex machine, then might we not treat our fellow man as we might treat a used car or a digital computer?

In this course, we will explore the largely forgotten ancient and traditional view of science, what replaced it, and the dreadful implications of the widely-held modern worldview.

Presenter Bio: Kerry Kuehn earned his B.S. from Cornell University (Engineering Physics), and his Ph.D. from the University of California in Santa Barbara (Physics). He has published his work on the physics of fluids in a variety of scientific journals, and he is the author of the acclaimed four-volume set *A Student's Guide through the Great Physics Texts*. Dr. Kuehn has served as a Professor at Wisconsin Lutheran College for over two decades, where he has developed an introductory physics sequence based on the analysis and discussion of seminal ancient and modern scientific texts, including Aristotle's Physics, Kepler's *New Astronomy*, and Einstein's *Relativity*. In this presentation we will explore a fourth answer: God is in charge of evil with a special emphasis on the Theology of the Cross.
